

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

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

He seemed to understand the wonder of the reader of this book when he said, "Often when you think you're at the end of something, you're at the beginning of something else."

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


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
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




























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




















































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














NOO





















WIM presents drawings with whimsical names, whose upside can also be their downside and whose downside can also be their upside.

In the 1970's, when he created these drawings, Roman Verostko wrote: "...the treasures of the spirit within us tend to be encumbered with objects, things, and everyday business. To enter one's imagination, to play, to delight in the gift of the human spirit—these free activities break through that prison and nurture the



quality of human life. Through these drawings I have attempted to enter that imagining mode in the life of the spirit and to evoke some of its treasures...."

In 2008 Roman mounted a mural based on these drawings in the new Fred Rogers Center at St. Vincent College in Latrobe, Pennsylvania. The drawings pay homage to "Mister Rogers" who nurtured the imagination of children by teaching them the wonderful adventure of living.


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
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
